



• What is a "robber baron"?


- A business owner or executive who acquires wealth through ethically questionable tactics.
- An American capitalist of the later part of the 19th century who became wealthy through exploitation.
- What is a "captain of industry"?
 - A business leader whose means of amassing a personal fortune contributes positively to the country in some way.


- Your team (pairs or trios) will now "research" six industrialists from the beginning of the Gilded Age.
