2. How did technological innovations in the workplace, such as the assembly line and mass production, affect American workers and American businesses?
3. Why was there a general rise in nativism in the 1920s?
4. In what ways did Hollywood films of the 1920s express the issues and characteristics of the time?
5. What caused the Great Migration, and what effect did it have on the political power of African Americans?
6. Describe the effect the stock market crash had on banks and identify how bank failures contributed to the coming of the Great Depression.
7. What impact did the Dust Bowl have on farmers living on the Great Plains?
8. Describe the measures some farmers took to raise prices on agricultural goods.
9. Describe President Roosevelt’s Hundred Days.
10. Why did President Roosevelt ask congress to abandon the Gold Standard?
11. Explain the idea of Social Security. How is this supposed to function?
12. Why did Roosevelt attempt “court packing”?
